Here is a part of the presenter's summary of 2) Movies and Social Issues. "I spoke about movies and social issues. This includes war, racism, bullying, oppression, genocide and nuclear power. I began with Native Americans and Hollywood. First, I talked about "Little Big Man" (1970), starring Dustin Hoffmann and Chief Dan George. This movie shows the Native American view through the chief of the Cheyenne, played by Chief Dan George. Next, I looked at Kevin Costner's "Dances with Wolves", where all of the Native American actors speak Lakota Sioux, which is the language of the tribe in the story."

The summary of 4) The Czechs and Slovaks. Czech Republic and Slovakia today are two states with very similar historical development, languages and cultures. The Czechs and Slovaks were once united as two nations after the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian Empire and lived side by side throughout the 20th century from 1918, most of the time as a federation, until Czechoslovakia peacefully separated in 1993. After gaining independence from the Soviet Union in 1989, the state was turning capitalistic and was undergoing a turbulent time of privatization and reforms. Both states' ideas of the necessary reforms and leadership were too different to find a compromise and thus the state split into Czech Republic and Slovakia. However, in 2004 both states joined the European Union and thus again enjoy liberties of free movement of people, goods, services, and capital."
